Genesis Bible Study with Fr. Damian

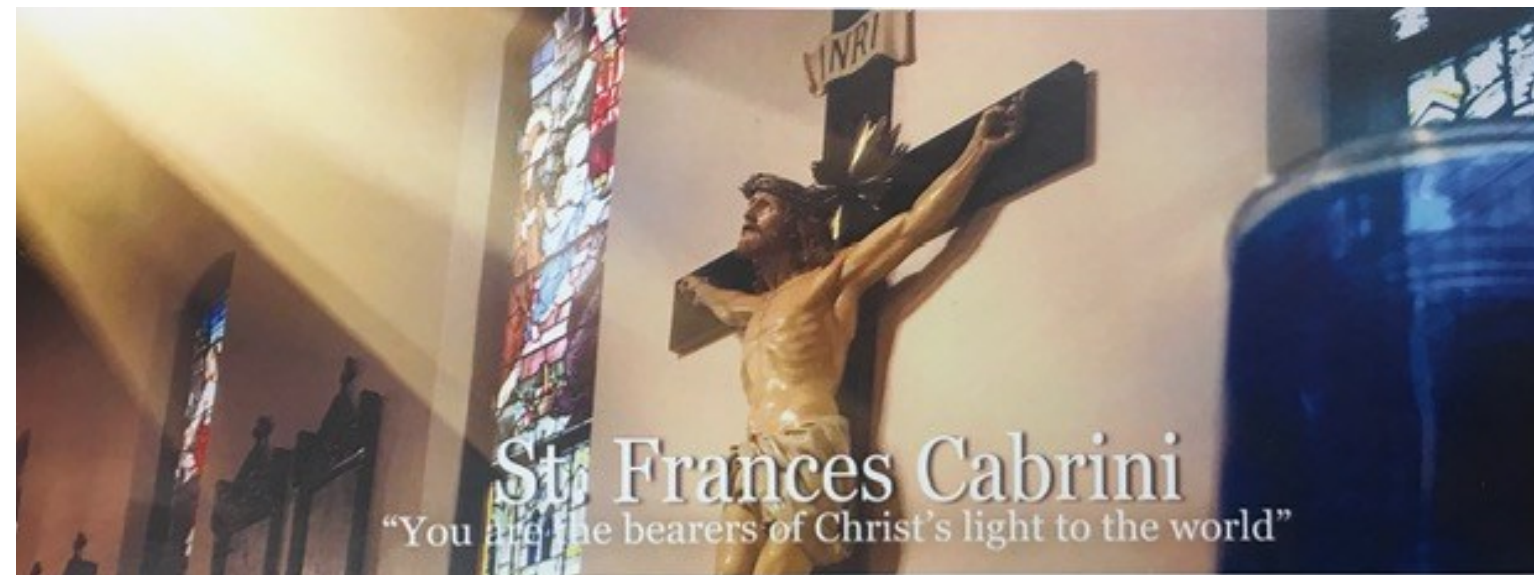

Cabrini Meatball/Sauce Drive-Thru, October 18th, 12:30 pm—? (until we sell out!)

St. Frances Cabrini Parish will continue its time-honored tradition of supporting All Saints Catholic School with the "Spaghetti Dinner", and still meeting COVID guidelines, by holding a Meatball/Sauce Drive-thru on October 18th, starting at 12:30 pm until we sell out. A bag of eight (8) meatballs will sell for \$10, one (1) quart of sauce will sell for \$5 and there will be loaves of Orsi's bread available for \$3 each. Using 10th Street in front of the Church and School, we'll have stations and runners to take orders and payment, then vehicles will move on down to the pick-up stations where runners will exchange their tickets for the pre-packaged meatballs and sauce. Parking Variance Permits have been obtained so watch signs that day so you don't park in a no-parking zone and get towed.

Volunteer positions are available for Friday, October 16th starting at 4 pm when the pre-packaging will be done in the All Saints School gym and kitchen. Use the parking lot/kitchen door to access the area. There are also Volunteer positions still open for Sunday, October 18th. There are three (3) shifts: 12-2 pm, 2-4 pm, and 4-6 pm or as needed. Positions include runners taking pre-packaged food from indoors to outside coolers, runners taking food from coolers to cars, traffic guides/sign holders, etc.

Note that we are starting sales at 12:30 pm to give the 11 am Mass attendees time to clear out. Quantities made are limited so we encourage you to buy early—waiting til 4 pm or later is at your own risk. Payment in the form of cash, checks, and credit/debit cards will be accepted. Spread the word and Come One, Come All! Enjoy meatballs and sauce with your home-cooked pasta and support All Saints School!

Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends,

Last Sunday, Pope Francis sent you a letter about friendship. Have you had a chance to read it? Okay, I admit, it is a bit long (more like a book than a letter) and maybe you have not had time to read it all. It will take hours to read the entire letter! Let me try to entice you to read it by giving you a little taste.

In an early part of the letter, Pope Francis shares Jesus' story of the Good Samaritan and then reflects on it:

The parable is clear and straightforward, yet it also evokes the interior struggle that each of us experiences as we gradually come to know ourselves through our relationships with our brothers and sisters. Sooner or later, we will all encounter a person who is suffering. Today there are more and more of them. The decision to include or exclude those lying wounded along the roadside can serve as a criterion for judging every economic, political, social and religious project. Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders. And if we extend our gaze to the history of our own lives and that of the entire world, all of us are, or have been, like each of the characters in the parable. All of us have in ourselves something of the wounded man, something of the robber, something of the passers-by, and something of the Good Samaritan.

It is remarkable how the various characters in the story change, once confronted by the painful sight of the poor man on the roadside. The distinctions between Judean and Samaritan, priest and merchant, fade into insignificance. Now there are only two kinds of people: those who care for someone who is hurting and those who pass by; those who bend down to help and those who look the other way and hurry off. Here, all our distinctions, labels and masks fall away: it is the moment of truth. Will we bend down to touch and heal the wounds of others? Will we bend down and help another to get up? This is today's challenge, and we should not be afraid to face it. In moments of crisis, decisions become urgent. It could be said that, here and now, anyone who is neither a robber nor a passer-by is either injured himself or bearing an injured person on his shoulders...

Each day offers us a new opportunity, a new possibility. We should not expect everything from those who govern us, for that would be childish. We have the space we need for co-responsibility in creating and putting into place new processes and changes. Let us take an active part in renewing and supporting our troubled societies. Today we have a great opportunity to express our innate sense of fraternity, to be Good Samaritans who bear the pain of other people's troubles rather than fomenting greater hatred and resentment. Like the chance traveler in the parable, we need only have a pure and simple desire to be a people, a community, constant and tireless in the effort to include, integrate and lift up the fallen. We may often find ourselves succumbing to the mentality of the violent, the blindly ambitious, those who spread mistrust and lies. Others may continue to view politics or the economy as an arena for their own power plays. For our part, let us foster what is good and place ourselves at its service.

The letter is a summary of all that Pope Francis has been saying since he became Pope. Please read it. It is available online or you can buy a nice printed version.
