

Pastor’s Letter

Dear Friends,

The gospel this Sunday always convicts me. I know the call to be neighbor that Jesus teaches to his disciples is so much more demanding than the way I normally live out being neighbor. I know I fall far short and need this reminder to choose to live differently.

It is very clear in the gospels that Jesus calls disciples, not admirers. Following Jesus requires not just a change of heart but a change of behavior. We are Christians not because of what we believe but because we truly strive to live the way Jesus taught us to live. We “follow” him. We act like him.

The theologian James McClendon once reported a story about Clarence Jordan, the founder of an interracial community called Koinonia Farm. Jordan, who described his community as a “demonstration plot” for the Kingdom of God, asked his brother, Robert, an attorney, to assist him in the struggle against the racial injustices of the Jim Crow South in the 1950’s. Robert was aware of the community’s hardships: Local citizens boycotted the farm, the Ku Klux Klan bombed the produce stands, and ominous letters flooded the mailbox:

“Clarence, I can’t do that. You know my political aspirations. Why if I represented you, I might lose my job, my house, everything I’ve got.” Robert said.

“We might lose everything too, Bob.”

“It is different for you.”

“Why is it different? I remember, it seems to me, that you and I joined the church the same Sunday, as boys. I expect when we came forward the preacher asked me the same question he asked you. He asked me, ‘Do you accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior?’ and I said, ‘Yes.’ What did you say?”

“I follow Jesus, Clarence, up to a point.”

“Could that point by any chance be—the cross?” Clarence replied.

“That’s right. I follow him to the cross, but not on the cross. I’m not getting myself crucified.”

“Then I don’t believe you’re a disciple. You’re an admirer of Jesus, but not a disciple of his. I think you ought to go back to the church you belong to, and tell them you’re an admirer, not a disciple.”

“Well now, if everyone who felt like I do did that, we wouldn’t have a church, would we?”

“The question,” Clarence said, “is, ‘Do you have a church?’”

To be a Christian, to be a disciple of Jesus, requires us to answer the question, “who is Jesus for me?” If I answer the question by saying that he is the Messiah, he is the Son of God, then I must live what I believe by striving to follow what Jesus taught. The stories of Jesus do not just entertain us. They train us to be like him in this world of ours.

“Who is my neighbor?” The lawyer, who asks the question, is looking for an answer which tells us the minimum necessary. But Jesus upends the lawyer’s desire for a minimum by giving him a maximum: “everyone you can love is your neighbor. If you can do good to him, he counts as your neighbor.”

I stand convicted of failing to do this. However, I also know that the only way I will ever be able to do this, is to let Jesus work in and through me. My love is insufficient, but Jesus’ love is not. It is boundless.
